URGENT THAT CHARGE BE ACCEPTED. Viscount Grey O. K.'s Reservations ALLIES FAVORABLE. Lodge to Bring Up Treaty Monday

(Bulletin) Washington, Feb. 2. (U. P.)—Senator Lodge today gave notice in the senate that on next Monday he will ask unanimous consent that senate rules be suspended and the peace treaty reservations be taken up.

(By L. C. Martin, U. P. Staff Cor.) Washington, Feb. 2.—Viscount Grey's letter urging that American reservations to the peace treaty be accepted by the British was taken today by senators on both sides of the controversy as vindicating their positions.

Populists said Grey's proved that the allies would accept the American reservations just to get the United States into the league. "Representing signatories with the whole story of President Wilson's inability to compromise with the senate, and justify their stand against the League Reservations."

Grey's letter was the general topic among senators today. Some of them expect its influence on public opinion to help speed ratification, by causing a flood of letters to senators urging ratification on the ground that it is plain that the reservations were "made any hitch abroad."

It was emphasized, however, by some Democrats that Grey spoke as a private individual and that while he had no official voice, his letter was the same sort of recommendation as contained in his letter there is nothing of final to indicate that the government agrees with Grey.

Senator Lodge and other Republicans have said they have known for months that the League reservation would not cause any hitch abroad. That influenced Lodge to give notice on the preamble to his reservations, by allowing a limitation of the provision for affirmative acceptance of the reservations, it was stated.

In general, Grey's letter is content on to have considerable effect on British public opinion by way of showing the mutual feelings of the British people, but as far as the senate is concerned, it neither helps or hurts, most senators believe.
